Insider tips for entering the game industry



RESUMÉ & COVER LETTER TIPS

- Format your resumé as a PDF—ideally 1 page, 2 max.
- Include a cover letter if the job description requests it.
- Keep your cover letter to max. 3 paragraphs.
- Highlight personal projects (especially collaborative).
- No industry experience? Show how your past non-industry experience is relevant.
- Make your resumé easy to scan—recruiters only give it about 30 seconds.



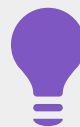
WHAT NOT TO DO

- If you're US-based, don't include a photo on your resumé.
- Don't apply for every single job at a studio—recruiters notice! Stick to one or a small number of similar roles.
- Don't send your portfolio with broken links or images.



CHANGING CAREERS

- Write your resumé for the job you want, not the job you have.
- Build a portfolio—this is essential!
- Create or work on games outside of studies.
- Highlight how your previously acquired soft and hard skills translate to games
- Read the job description and ensure you showcase the skills they're asking for in your resumé and portfolio.
- Join Discord channels and participate in game jams and group projects to build your community.
- Volunteer at relevant events and conferences (GDC, Siggraph, Lightbox Expo, etc.) for experience, free event access, and network-building.
- Update your LinkedIn to match your resumé and be clear on what roles you want. Include a portfolio link. Follow relevant studios and build community!



PORTFOLIO TIPS

- Align your portfolio to the company/project you want to work for.
- Your portfolio shows studios what you're capable of and how you might fit into a team, so be consistent.
- Quality over quantity. Keep it concise and only include your best work.
- Show your process—iterations, explanations, mood boards, etc.
- Coursework is fine to include, but it's best to take those projects and go beyond the original requirements to make them unique.



INTERVIEWING

- Research the company and interviewers before your interview.
- Show interest by asking relevant questions.
- Direct your questions to the right people: ask recruiters about next steps in the interview process, benefits, etc. and creative/technical staff about more job-specific questions (e.g., day in the life, etc.)
- Technical skills.
- Previous experience/relevant projects.
- Graduation dates (specifically for internships).
